

## Bismarck Welcomes the State Class A **Boys' and Girls' Basketball Tournament**

This year marks the second year of the combined State Girls' and Boys' Class A Basketball Tournament and the first year of the Bismarck Civic Center serving as the host site. The tournament will run for three days, on two floor the first two days, and one floor on Saturday. One floor will be in the Civic Arena (the traditional site of our tournaments) and the Civic Center's Exhibit Hall will be the site of the second floor.

All of Thursday's games will be considered a single session. Friday will be divided into two sessions to allow for television coverage. Saturday will be considered as one session. On Thursday, the girls' first round will be played in the Exhibit Hall starting at 2:00 p.m. with the boys' first round played in the Civic Arena starting at 3:00 p.m. Friday's schedule in the Exhibit Hall starts with the boys' consolation semi-finals, followed by the girls' consolation semi-finals. The semi-finals for the girls will lead off Friday's action in the Civic Arena at 1:00 p.m. and 2:45 p.m. and the boys' semi-finals will be played at 6:30 p.m. and 8:15 p.m. On Saturday, play goes to one floor – the Civic Arena. The girls' and boys' consolation championships will be played at 11:00 a.m. and 12:45 p.m., respectively, followed by the girls' and boys' third place games at 2:30 p.m. and 4:15 p.m. The girls' and boys' state championships are scheduled for 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m., respectively. #### NDHSAA TOURNAMENT CODE OF CONDUCT

**Purpose:** To elevate standards of Good Sportsmanship and to encourage the growth of responsible citizenship among the students, member schools and their personnel.

#### **Fundamentals of Good Sportsmanship**

- 1- Know, appreciate and understand the rules of the contest.
- 2- Show respect for the officials. Good Sportsmanship implies the willingness to accept and abide by the decisions of the officials.
- 3- Show respect for the opponent at all times. Good Sportsmanship is the Golden Rule in action.
- 4- Recognize and appreciate the skill of performance regardless of team affiliation.
- 5- Maintain self-control at all times. Good Sportsmanship is a responsibility of all who are involved in the game.
- 6- Show a positive attitude in cheering, refraining from intimidation or negative cheering. Good Sportsmanship is cheering your own team "on to victory."

#### **Acts of Misconduct**

- 1- Throwing of any object onto the playing floor or in the stands.
- 2- Behavior deemed dangerous or which interferes with the rights of others to watch the game.
- 3- Possessing, consuming or being under the influence of chemicals.
- 4- Use of obscene, profane or abusive language or gestures, signs, posters or banners which show disrespect for opponent's team, officials, cheerleaders, band or other performing groups.
- 5- The use of noise-makers.
- 6- Entry onto the playing surface at any time.

# Information Concerning the North Dakota High School Activities Association

#### I. Membership

The North Dakota High School Activities Association is a voluntary non-profit organization of the high schools of the State of North Dakota. All 185 schools eligible for membership belong to the Association. Membership is granted upon application of the School Board, at which time the school agrees to enforce the rules which the members have established and to participate in the legislative processes of modification and revision of rules to fit changing needs of the member schools and students.

#### II. Purposes

To unify the high schools of the state in the promotion of pure amateur sports, music and speech activities.

To standardize the eligibility rules and regulations under which interscholastic contests are held

To provide the schools of the state with sound and adequate programs of extracurricular activities.

To promote the maintenance of standards which conform with the educational objectives of the schools.

To improve standards of play and to develop understanding of rules governing play.

To prevent the exploitation of the schools, the school activities, and the students enrolled therein.

#### III. Brief History

The Activities Association was founded in 1908 under the name of the High School League and originally was concerned only with athletics. In 1923 the state organization became affiliated with the National Federation of High School Associations. A full-time executive director was employed in 1949, an assistant was added in 1963, a girl's sports supervisor in 1973, and a music and speech coordinator in 1978.

In 1950 the Consolidated League, an organization of the smaller schools of the state, affiliated with the High School League, thereby uniting all high schools of the state under one organization. Music and speech activities were placed under the direction of the Association in 1955, and the name was changed to the North Dakota High School Activities Association at that time.

Schools in the League were all one class for basketball competition from 1908 to 1932. A two-class system was used from 1933 to 1947 and three-class system from 1948 to 1963. In 1964 the two-class system was restored and this arrangement has been in effect since then up to the present time.

Official state champions have been named in track since 1908 and in basketball since 1914. Official champions in other sports were later added as follows: golf and tennis 1938; baseball 1950; wrestling 1959; cross-country 1961; hockey 1967; girls 'track, golf and tennis 1966; girls 'gymnastics 1969; girls' basketball 1974; boys' and girls' swimming 1974. State football championships were determined off and on between 1916 and 1959, when the practice was discontinued, but again restored in 1975. Basketball tournaments for girls were conducted by the Consolidated League for a number of years and by the NDHSAA from 1952 to 1960, at which time they were discontinued because of the small number of schools fielding teams. Girls' basketball was reinstated as an Association-sponsored activity in 1973 on a district level, with separate state Class A and Class B championships being named since 1974. Class A girls' volleyball state champions were first named in 1984 and Class B girls' state hockey champions were first named in 1989. Boys' state soccer champions were first named in 295 and girls' state soccer champions in 1996. Girls' state hockey champions were first named in 2003.

#### SPORTSMANSHIP

Good sportsmanship is conduct which imposes a type of self-control involving honest rivalry, courteous relations and graceful acceptance of results. School spirit is a reflection of those attitudes and behavior. Spectator etiquette requires that we refrain from displaying any action to taunt the opponent's fan section such as carrying flags around the court and stopping to taunt the opponent's fan section. This may lead to competition among observers which is mistakenly under the auspice of good sportsmanship.

Spectators are asked to remain in their designated fan section. Approaching the opponent's fan section with the purpose of taunting and baiting will not be tolerated. The carrying of flags around the court will not be allowed.

Good sportsmanship shall be defined as those qualities which are characterized by generosity and genuine concern for others. An awareness is expected of the impact of an individual's influence on the behavior of others. Good sportsmanship is viewed as a concrete measure of the understanding and commitment to fair play, ethical behavior and integrity.

#### V Activities

The following chart indicates the activities sponsored by the Association, the number of junior and senior high schools participating, and the approximate number of students participating in interscholastic competition during the 2002-2003 school year.

#### V. Registration of Officials and Interpretation Meetings

More than 1,334 officials are registered with the North Dakota High School Activities Association. These men and women are furnished rule books for the sports in which they officiate, and examinations are provided annually in football, basketball, hockey, gymnastics, soccer, volleyball, and wrestling. Upon meeting certain prescribed standards, the members advance from "apprentice" officials, "registered" and finally to "certified" classifications.

During the past year, 60 rules interpretation meetings have been held throughout the state, and more than 5,000 individuals attended these meetings. Meetings were held for baseball, basketball, football, golf, gymnastics, hockey, soccer, swimming, track, volleyball and wrestling.

#### VI. Cheerleader Clinics

The NDHSAA has recognized the importance of safety in cheerleading. Because of this, the Association has added rules/safety clinics for head cheer coaches of all member schools. These clinics recognize the importance of informing cheer coaches of proper safety techniques as well as emphasizing the responsibility of cheerleaders for sportsmanship and crowd control.

#### VII. Video Service

The Association maintains a library of videos on sports and fine arts and are on file at the NDHSAA office and can be viewed by schools upon request.

#### VIII. Organization of Association

BOARD OF DIRECTORS - The Board of Directors consists of 11 members, three of which are administrators of member Class A schools, four superintendents of Class B schools, one high school principal as a member-at-large, and one athletic director. These representatives are elected by the membership as a whole, with each school having one vote. In addition, a representative of the North Dakota Schools Boards Association and the Superintendent of Public Instruction serve as members of the Board.

REPRESENTATIVE ASSEMBLY - The superintendent or high school principal of each school serves as a member of the representative assembly, with each school being entitled to one vote. An annual meeting is held each year to adopt rules and regulations governing inter-school contests and eligibility regulations. All such rules are made by the representative assembly.

**DISTRICT COMMITTEES** - The district activities are controlled and managed by committees elected by school officials in each area.

**EXECUTIVE OFFICERS** - The administration of the various programs and the implementation of the policies of the Association are placed in the hands of an executive secretary and three assistants who are employed by the Association.

## **GIRLS' COACHES' PROFILES**



#### **BISMARCK CENTURY PATRIOTS**

**Jim Jeske** is in his third year as head girls' basketball coach at Century High School. During his second season as coach, the Patriots finished the regular season as WDA Champions with a record of 22-3, setting a single season win record for Century. The Patriots finished third at state. Jim is currently in his fourteenth year of coaching. Jeske graduated in 1985 from New England High School. In 1989 he earned his bachelor's degree in elementary education from the University of Mary.

Previously, Jim coached three years at Sargent Central (1989-1992), and eight years in Carrington (1992-2000), where he led the Cardinals to a State Boys' Class B Championship in 1995. Jim was awarded the 2003 Coach of the Year Award and State Coach of the Year.

Jim and his wife, Trish, have three children: Hannah, 10, James, 8, and Thomas, 1 1/2. Jim teaches sixth grade at Centennial Elementary.



#### **DICKINSON MIDGETS**

**Greg Jung** is a native of New England and graduated from New England Public High School in 1985. Coach Jung participated in football and basketball and played in the 1985 State Class B Tournament. While attending Dickinson State University, Jung began his basketball coaching career in his hometown, serving as an assistant varsity coach for two seasons.

After earning his bachelor's degree in Biology Education in 1990 from DSU, he began teaching in South Heart where he spent eight years. He served as a varsity boys' assistant coach from 1990-1993 and was the head boys' basketball coach for three seasons from 1994-1996. In 1997, Jung served as an assistant mens' basketball coach for the DSU Blue Hawks. The Dickinson Public Schools hired Jung in the fall of 1998, and he was the assistant girls' and boys' basketball coach. Jung was named the head girls' basketball coach in 1999 and was an assistant boys' basketball coach from 1998-2000. In 2000, his peers named him the West Region Coach of the Year. Jung is currently in his 14th year of teaching science and his 16th year of coaching high school basketball. He has been married for 11 years to Jennifer and has three children, Landen, 10, Ireland, 6, and Aiden, 2.





#### **FARGO SOUTH BRUINS**

**Craig Flaagan** is in his 12th year as head coach of the Bruin girls' basketball program, he has been coaching girls' and boys' basketball at South for all 24 years of his coaching career. Coach Flaagan has now led the Bruins to eleven state tournament appearances, winning the state championship in 1992 and 1994, third place finishes in 1993 and 1994, fourth place in 1996 and 2003 and fifth place in 1995 and 1998. He has guided the Bruins to five conference and four region titles.

Craig was named North Dakota "Coach of the Year" in 1992 and EDC "Coach of the Year" in 1992, 1993 and 2000. He also was North Dakota Winter Sports "Assistant Coach of the Year" in 1992.

He has also been a part of three championship teams as an assistant coach, two with the South boys in 1986 and 1989 and one with the girls in 1985.

Craig is a lifelong Fargo resident, graduating from Fargo North in 1975 and Concordia College in 1979. He teaches physical education at Agassiz Middle School. His daughter Kari is a freshman at Concordia College in Moorhead.



#### **GRAND FORKS CENTRAL KNIGHTS**

**Jean Roise** is in her fourth season with the Grand Forks Central Knights. Jean is a Berthold ND native, who attended UND-Williston for two years and went on to graduate from Kansas State University.

Her coaching career started at Red River High School in 1984. She coached the Roughriders to their first-ever state championship in 1988 and a runner-up finish in 1992. In nine years at Red River her teams qualified for the state tournament five times and finished in the top five every year. Jean was named State Class A Coach of the Year in 1988.

In 1993 Roise took over as Head Coach at UND-Williston, where she led her team to a 26-6 mark and a berth in the NJCAA Tournament in Tyler, Texas. From there Jean went on to coach at Moorhead State University from 1994-2000. In her first year, the Dragons went to the NAIA Play-offs in Kansas City, before making the transition to the NCAA Division II level. Roise was also the women's golf coach at MSU.

Jean serves as Activities Director at GFC and also teaches in the Physical Education Department.





#### **GRAND FORKS RED RIVER ROUGHRIDERS**

Terry West has been the head girls' basketball coach at Grand Forks Red River High School for the past seven years. Terry has a won/loss record of 115-48 at Red River, with state tournament appearances in 1997, 2000, 2001, and 2003. Prior to that, Terry had been the head girls' basketball coach for five years in Grafton. Terry complied an 84-41 record while at Grafton, including North Star Regional titles in 1987, 1988, and 1989.

The following year Grafton switched to the EDC and the Spoilers won their first and only regular season and regional titles, while placing fifth at the state tournament. All five of his teams in Grafton reached the state tournament. Terry was also head girls' basketball coach in Devils Lake from 1992-1996. Devils Lake had their first back-to-back winning seasons in over ten years during this stay with Devils Lake. Terry has been named North Star Regional Coach of the Year in 1987, 1988, 1989, and Eastern Dakota Conference Coach of the Year in 1990 while at Grafton, 1995 while at Devils Lake, and 2001 while at Grand Forks Red River. Terry was also named State Class A Coach of the Year in 1989. His overall won/loss record is 234-158 entering the regional tournament. Terry was also President of the North Dakota High School Coaches Association in 2000 and currently holds the position of Past President in the NDHSCA. Terry is also the Class A chairperson for the Lions All-Star committee for the North Dakota High School Coaches Association.

#### **MANDAN BRAVES**

**Greg Amundson.** This is coach Amundson's 28th season as a head girls' basketball coach, having spent four years in New Town (1974-1977) and 24 years in Mandan (1980-present). Coach Amundson led his New Town team to a second place finish in the 1976 state tournament.

Over the past eleven years, Amundson's Mandan teams have compiled a 192-11 record against WDA competitors during regular season and tournament play. They have been regular season WDA champions 10 times and WDA tournament champions eight times. His overall coaching record is 459-171.

## 1978 STATE CLASS A GIRLS TOURNAMENT

The fifth annual Class A Girls Basketball Tournament was played in Jamestown again and the field of teams included the two qualifiers from each of the four regions in the class A structure. Absent from this year's tournament, however, was three-time state champion, Williston, who had a 57-game winning streak stopped by Bottineau in the Northwest Region semi-finals.

The tournament manager was Jamestown High School athletic director Ron Luttschwager and the referees were: Del Gab, Manuel Joia, Jim Montgomery, Garry Pearson, Larry Rafferty, Maurice Railing, James Schieffer and Rudy Steidel. Executive Secretary of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was Frank Smith and Jamestown Superintendent Frank Fischer, was the NDHSAA President.

Langdon, under Coach Dennis Throndset, a qualifier in each of the four previous tourneys, came in with an 11 and 5 record and were one of the two representatives from the Northeast. The other Northeast qualifier was Coach Pat Sullivan's Grand Forks Central team – a winner of 14 of 17 games thus far. From the Southeast, Coach Dick Ryan brought the 13 and 4 Fargo Shanley Deacons into the state tourney while Fargo North, at 12-4, under Coach Mark Askerooth, would be the other Southeast representative.

Coached by Gary Mortenson, Bottineau survived the Northwest Tournament and would come to the state tourney with an 11 and 6 record. Also advancing from the Northwest would be the Minot Majettes under the direction of coach Bruce Anderson. Bismarck Century, coached by Norm Diutot

and carrying a record of 9 wins and 7 losses, qualified from the Southwest while Cindy Haught's Dickinson Midgets, owner of a 14 game winning streak and only 2 losses, completed the field.

A total of twelve points separated the winners from the losers in the tournament's first round as the teams seemed to cautiously survey their opponents. In the opener, tournament veteran, Langdon, led all the way in a narrow 43 to 40 win over Bismarck Century. All-stater, Lisa Beiers led the Cardinals in scoring while Kelly Owens and Judi Gartner with 11 apiece and Melinda Smith with 10 were Century's leaders. Minot overcame a three-quarter deficit of 31 to 34 and went on to nip Fargo North 46–45, in the afternoon's second game. Sandy Thor's pressure free throw with five seconds remaining was the margin of victory. Julie Eckman scored 20 points for the Majettes while Thor totaled 11. Sarah Luken with 11 points and Diane Worner with 10 led North.

Trailing by five points at the end of the third period, the Bottineau Stars outscored Fargo Shanley 12 to 4 in the last quarter as they advanced to the semi-finals with a 35 to 32 victory. The Stars All-Stater Sheri Christian, with 18 points, was the only player in double figures for either team. Carol Fisher led the Deacons with 9 points and Mary Jean Liffrig had 7. Turnovers played a big role in the first day's final game as Dickinson committed only four in the first three quarters while Grand Forks Central suffered 18 in their 44 to 39 loss to the Midgets. Mary Herhusky led the Dickinson

scoring with 16 points while Sue Watrel had 8. Central's leaders were Donna Corcoran with 11 points and Mickey Young with 8.

In consolation play, Fargo North had a big 18-point last quarter coming from behind to defeat Bismarck Century by a score of 42 to 36. Mary Sweeney led the Spartans with 13 points while Diane Worner had 11 and Sarah Lucken 10. For the Patriots, Melinda Smith scored 13 points and Kelley Owen 10. The Shanley Deacons coasted to a 46–29 win over Grand Forks Central in the second consolation game as Mary Jean Liffrig with 12 points and Carol Fischer with 10 were the Deacon's leading scorers. Lisa Perault was Central's leader with 6 points.

In the semi-finals, Minot High survived the 31 points scored by Langdon's Lisa Beiers and their 23 turnovers to beat the Cardinals in overtime, 59 to 56. Sophomore Anita Novak led the Majettes with 20 points while Julie Eckman had 16 and Sandi Thor 10 points. Bottineau, with greater quickness, held Dickinson's Cindy Haught and Michelle Gab to just 9 points apiece as they downed the Midgets by a 43–37 margin. Sheri Christian with 15 and Deb Hahn with 14 points were the Stars' leaders.

Shanley won the consolation championship on Saturday afternoon as the Deacons opened up a 47 to 35 margin on their way to a final score of 51 to 44 over Fargo North. Sophomore Jane Obermiller led the Shanley scoring with 14 points while Laurie Worrier had 10. Diane Worner led North with 14 points and Lisa Schwartz had 10. Dickinson, with no

one in double figures, defeated Langdon by a 50-45 measure in the game for third place. The Midgets shot 48% from the field on 21 of 48 attempts. Lisa Beiers was the Cardinals leader again as she counted 21 points. Joyce Sauer had 11 for Langdon, who was 19 of 56 from the field (34%).

Bruce Anderson's Minot Majettes, with four starters between 5' 10" and 6' 2", became the 1978 Class A champion as they stopped Bottineau 36 to 29 in the state title game. Bottineau attempted to counter the Majettes' height advantage with a full court press and did cut the Minot lead from 11 points to 5 points with 2 minutes to go, but Minot held on. Minot was 12 for 29 (41%) in field goal attempts and the Stars were 13 for 32 (40%). The Majettes' scoring leaders were Sandy Thor with 15 points and Julie Eckman with 12. Bottineau's leaders were Sherri Christian with 12 points and Karen Knudson with 7.

The Majettes were an unlikely winner as they had dropped four of their last five regular season games. Their future looked good, however, as four of their top six players would be returning for the 1979 season.

# RULES CHANGES IN HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL OVER THE YEARS

Compiled by: Bob Schaible and Dick Schindler, Bismarck

Please note, this list summarizes in brief the rules altering the game, found in the 2002-2004 Basketball Handbook of the National Federation of State High School Associations.

- **1892** Air dribble legalized; suggested court dimensions of 150 by 200 feet.
- **1893** Three points for a goal and one for each foul called; pivot allowed; two 20-minutes halves; five man teams suggested; center jump initiated.
- Required boundary, line 3 feet from the wall; halftime set at 10 minutes and goals changed; free throw adopted as a penalty for a foul.
- 1895 Free-throw line put on court at 1.5 feet; double foul defined; backboard introduced; time-out allowed for sickness or accident; three-man officiating plan adopted.
- 1986 Dimensions of a ball were defined; two points for a field goal and one for a free throw.
- **1897** Court dimensions became a part of the rules.
- **1898** Dribbling legalized.
- 1902 Spectators must be at least 6 feet from the goal.
- 1903 Basics of the two-man officiating system adopted.
- 1904 Wood backboard adopted; ball out of bounds goes to the opponent.
- 1905 Basic out-of-bounds and throw-in rules adopted; blocking prohibited.
- 1906 Open-ended baskets legalized; backboard painted white.
- 1908 Double dribble prohibited; players allowed only 5 fouls.
- 1909 Glass backboards legalized.
- 1910 Players allowed only 4 fouls; basics of traveling rule adopted.
- 1911 Two-shot foul adopted; two-handed dribble eliminated.
- 1912 Numbers on front of uniform.
- 1913 Face-guarding became illegal.
- 1915 Held ball if closely guarded without ball from play.
- 1916 No time limit of individual player possession.
- 1920 Player could re-enter the game once.
- 1921 Captain could call time-out only when his team has possession.
- **1922** Four, eight minute quarters established; many technical fouls became violations.
- 1923 Player fouled must shoot free throws.
- **1924** One-minute intermission between quarters.
- **1925** Three-minute overtime established.
- 1929 Two-step stop was adopted.
- **1931** Time-out reduced from 2 minutes to one.
- 1932 Ten-second backcourt rule adopted, three-second lane restriction, free-throw lane space marking adopted.
- 1934 Ball circumference not less than 29 1/2 inches.
- 1935 Revised dribble definition regarding control of the ball; on jumps at the free-throw line, all nonjumpers must remain outside the circle until the ball is tapped.
- 1936 A 6-foot radius restraining circle established around the center-jump spot: four time-out periods are permitted; an incoming substitute is allowed to communicate with teammates.
- 1937 Jump ball after each goal was eliminated: only two overtime periods allowed; player prohibited from touching the ball or basket while the ball is directly above the rim.
- 1938 End lines 4 feet behind the backboard; division line is in the backcourt; "sudden death" to decide tie games in first overtime.
- 1940 Recommend home team wear light-colored suits; players be numbered from "3" upward.
- 1941 When space is limited, three-foot restraining lines used .
- 1942 Eligible player disqualified on fifth foul; in an overtime period the referee to toss the ball to start the game.
- 1943 One free throw for each part of a double and multiple foul; fan-shaped backboards to be used.
- 1944 Five personal fouls permitted prior to disqualification; player permitted to reenter any number of times; basics of goaltending rule adopted.
- 1945 Violation for player to touch the basket while the ball is on the rim; set of officials' signals adopted.
- 1946 Legalized transparent backboards; if player stops with neither foot in advance, he can pivot on either foot; clock starts when the ball is tossed on jump or crosses the plan on a throw-in.
- 1947 Rectangular target required on backboards; ball becomes live on a throw-in when it touches a player on the court; jump ball at nearest circle.
- 1948 Recommend that player who fouled should hold his hand above the head; coach could talk to players during charged time-out and intermission.
- **1949** All periods start with a center jump.



- 1950 Clock is stopped for all jumps; definitions adopted for basket, control, pass, screen, throw-in and try for goal.
- 1951 Any player may shoot a technical-foul free throw.
- 1952 Bonus penalty for common fouls.
- 1955 Rubber-covered ball may be used.
- 1956 Names must be submitted at least 10 minutes before the game; offensive goaltending adopted; no hanging on the rim.
- 1957 Twelve-foot lane mandatory; ball color must be tan or yellow; starters must be designated three minutes before the game; ball is out of bounds when it passes over the rectangular backboards.
- 1958 One additional time-out for each overtime period; close-guarded is within 6 feet.
- 1959 Guard must have both feet on floor to establish legal guarded position.
- 1960 Ball must be orange or natural tan; recommend that the scorer wear identifying apparel.
- **1961** "Sudden death" overtime eliminated; three-minute overtime periods; substitutes no longer required to report by position.
- 1962 Violation to swing elbows excessively; urgently recommended that the scorer wear a black-and-white striped shirt: an error made while the clock is stopped must be corrected before it starts.
- 1963 No time allowed to tie shoe laces, etc; "force-out" provision eliminated.
- 1964 No throw-in from behind the backboard; officials jurisdiction starts 10 minutes before the game; timers warning signal at 15 seconds; withdrawn player may not reenter during the same stopped-clock period; period does not end until all related activity ends.
- **1965** Correctable error provision adopted.
- 1966 Hard lower arm or finger casts, braces, pads, etc. are illegal; semi-circle becomes part of the free-throw lane.
- 1967 Dunking during game is illegal; five second mid-court rule adopted.
- 1968 Three officials allowed; successive time-outs are not allowed after end of the fourth period or any overtime period.
- 1969 Air dribble eliminated; intentional foul may be personal or technical.
- 1970 Dunking prohibited during warm-up; officials jurisdiction starts 30 minutes before game.
- 1973 Padding on bottom of backboard is mandatory; only designated thrower may be out of bounds.
- 1974 Fouling player not required to raise hand; referee tosses ball to start each quarter.
- 1975 Starters must be designated 10 minutes before game; rim may not be grasped at any time; no time-out when an injured player is removed.
- **1976** NFHS published one book for boys' and girls' competition; dunking allowed except before the game and during intermission.
- 1977 Players may not wear jewelry; identified when the coach could rise from the bench.
- 1978 Rectangular backboards legalized.
- 1979 Player-control foul only by player holding or dribbling.
- 1981 Moveable rim specifications adopted.
- 1982 North Dakota adopts three-point goal for Class A and Badlands Conference play.
- 1983 Air-born shooter rules adopted.
- 1985 Ball for airls are to be 1 inch smaller and 2 ounces lighter.
- **1987** Adopted three-point field goal statewide.
- 1989 Permitted red light behind backboard; three color numbers allowed.
- 1990 Halftime may be extended to 15 minutes; defined double technical.
- 1991 Combined personal and technical fouls for player disqualification and to reach bonus bonus begins on seventh team foul in half; compression shorts same color as pants allowed; except for head coach, two technical fouls result in disqualification.
- 1992 Injured player must leave game.
- 1993 Shirts designated to be worn inside the pants and pants must be above the hips.
- 1994 Overtime period is four minutes; ejected player to bench, not vicinity of; second technical to head coach is ejection.
- 1995 Bonus free throw on seventh, eighth, and ninth team fouls each half, two thereafter; tobacco use is technical foul.
- 1996 Player's undershirt sleeves must be same length; electronic devices and computers at courtside not allowed for coaching purposes.
- 1997 Reduced full-length time-out to three and added two 20-second time-outs; restricted movement of free-throw lane until ball touches ring on backboard
- 1998 Head coach allowed to call timeout; limits on substitutions during free throws until last throw is administered.
- 1999 Jerseys numbers 1 and 2 are permitted: head coach asked to verify that their players wear legal and proper uniforms.
- **2000** Officials asked to remind participants about sporting behavior at the pre-game conference; two 20-second timeouts extended to 30 seconds each; illegal contact on backboard is clarified.
- 2001 Authorized use of a 14-foot coaching box: an X on the floor in front of the official scorer required; use of artificial noisemakers prohibited; substitutes only required to report their own numbers; playing of music/sound effects only permitted during pre-game, timeouts, intermission and post-game.
- 2002 Permits bleeding/injured player to remain in game if team takes time out; adds exceptions to the definition of player control foul when a jumper catches the ball during a jump ball.



#### **BISMARCK DEMONS**

**Steve Miller**, coach of the 1994, 2000, and 2001 North Dakota State Class A Boys' Basketball Champions, is in his fourteenth year as the Bismarck High School head coach. #### 1954 STATE CLASS A BOYS' TOURNAMENT

The State Class A Basketball Tournament, throughout the 1950's, had a qualifying format that was much like the procedure that is used now. Four teams from each of two tournaments until they lost two games so the champions and runners-up, along with the third and fifth place teams, advanced to the state tournament.

The University of North Dakota Fieldhouse in Grand Forks would be hosting the State Class A High School Tournament for the third year in a row and Grand Forks Principal, Lawrence Hanson, would be the tournament manager. Four officials: H.R. Hoidal of Fargo, Orville Iwen, of Amenia, Sid Grande of Rugby and Earl Hoffman of Grand Forks worked the games. Earl Abrahamson was the North Dakota High School League Executive Secretary and Devils Lake Superintendent, F.H. Gilliland, was the organization's President.

In 1954, Bismarck High failed to qualify, so they would not be back to defend their 1953 title. St. Mary's of Bismarck, last year's runners-up did make it back for 1954, however, and they were joined by three other qualifiers from the West Region, Jamestown Bluejays, the Coyotes from Williston and the Minot High Magicians. Wahpeton, Valley City, Devils Lake and Grand Forks qualified from the East Region. Jim Hastings coached the Jamestown Bluejays, Cliff Hendrickson was the Williston coach, Art Hovde continued to direct the Minot Magicians, and Father Blaine Cook had the Bismarck St. Mary's Saints. Eastern Dakota coaches included Alan Adams at Wahpeton, Al Larvick at Valley City, Fritz Engel at Grand Forks Central and Roy Reslock at Devils Lake.

In the tournament opener, Valley City led all the way in upending Minot High by a 62-52 margin. The Hi-Liners built up a 7 point margin at the end of the first quarter and expanded it to quarter leads of 29-20 at the half and 48-34 at the end of three periods. Hib Hill, Valley City's 6-5 all-stater, led the scoring with 19 points and Julian Carlson followed with 16. Gary Cranston led Minot with 15 points, while Gene Anseth had 13 for the Magicians. Shooting statistics had Minot with 17 of 65 (26%) from the field and Valley City at 21 of 58% (36%). The Hi-Liners were 20 of 32 from the free throw line while the Magicians were 18 of 28.

A big third quarter, in which they stretched a 31 to 27 halftime margin to 54-32 at the end of three periods, put Williston in the semi-final round as the Coyotes defeated Grand Forks by a final margin of 61 to 48. Williston had a much better shooting night than Central as they were successful on 21 of 49 (43%) from the field while Grand Forks shot 26% on 17 of 65. The Coyotes had a poor night at the free throw line on 18 of 39 (46%) but had nineteen more attempts than Central. The Coyotes' big men, Bruce Haroldson and Slim Williams led their scoring with 22 and 20, respectively. Harold King and Gabe Kavadas led Grand Forks with 15 apiece.

Dean Sharp with 20 points and Duke Schneider with 17 led St. Mary's to a 72 to 50 win over Devils Lake in the evening's first game. The Saints pulled away from a 56-46 margin at the three-quarter mark as they out-pointed the Satans by 12 in the last period. Devils Lake had a poor shooting night as they scored on just 18 of 84 field attempts, while the Saints were successful on 27 of 74. Devils Lake had three players in double figures: Darrel Bye with 14, and Ladd Conrad and Orville Baker with 12 apiece.

In the third round's final game, Wahpeton took a 17 point half-time lead and expanded it to a margin of 26 in a 75-49 win over Jamestown. Harmon Krause with 25 points and Roger Gebhart with 23, paced Wahpeton while Morris Elhard with 18 and Ron Joslin with 12 paced the Blue-Jays. Wahpeton shot 30 of 77 (39%) from the field and 15 of 28 (54%) from the free throw line. The Jays were 32% from the field on 21 of 65 and were 17 of 36 (47%) from the free throw line.

In Friday's consolation play, Gabe Kavadas and Harold King each counted 22 points as Grand Forks led all the way in scoring a 53-48 win over the Magicians. Gary Holum led Minot's scoring with 21 points (13 of them on free throws) and he was the only Magician to score in double figures. Jamestown rallied from a ten point (44-34) margin at the end of the third quarter to out point Devils Lake 51-49. Ron Joslin with 20 points was the Blue Jays scoring leader while Alan Taylor led Devils Lake with 18 points. Ten years later (1964) Taylor would be back to coach Grafton High School to the 1964 title on this same court.

Valley City was successful on just 3 of 36 field goal attempts in the first half of their semi-final game with Williston. This kind of shooting left the Hi-Liners with a half-time deficit of 27 to 12 and not even their second half shooting turn-around of 46% on 15 of 32 was enough to beat the Coyotes. The Coyotes were able to maintain the lead throughout the game and advanced to the 1954 finals with a 48-47 victory. The Coyotes shot 17 of 52 (33%) for the game and were led in scoring, Larry Treider with 13 points Bruce Haroldson with 12, and Slim Williams with 10. Hib Hill scored 13 points and Danny McGee 12 for Valley City.

Leading by 39 to 31 at half-time, Wahpeton out-scored Bismarck St. Mary's 27 to 11 in the third period and took a commanding 24 point lead after three quarters. The Wops



moved into Saturday's finals with a final score of 78 to 61. Two Wahpeton players combined for 55 of the Wop's final totals as Harom Krause scored 29 on 8 field goals and 13 of 14 free throws and Roger Gebhart had 26. Dick Tschider scored 15 for St. Mary's and was the only Saint in double figures. Wahpeton made 27 of 67 (40%) field goal attempts and was 24 of 34 (70%) from the free throw line. The Saints made 22 of 62 (35%) from the field and 17 of 25 (68%) from the free throw line.

In Saturday's contest for consolation honors, Jamestown defeated Grand Forks 45 to 44 in overtime. Bill Soulis had 14 and Morris Ellhard 10 to lead the Bluejays while Gabe Kavadas's 13 points and Harold Kings 11 led Grand Forks. In a game who's lead changed hands four times, Valley City scored a 67 to 64 win over St. Mary's in the game for third place. Hib Hill came through with the 1954 tournament's biggest numbers as he counted 35 points for the Hi-Liners. Jerry Sowden added 12 points and Duane DeVries 11 to the Valley City point total. The Saints scoring leaders were Duke Schneider with 23, Dick Cieslak with 16 and Dean Sharp with 13.

Down 26-19 on 19% shooting in the first half, Wahpeton came back for a 50-48 win in the 1954 championship match against the Williston Coyotes. The Wops ended up with 19 of 63 (30%) for the game while Williston was 18 of 55 for (33%). The Coyotes were successful on 12 of 21 (57%) from the free throw line, while Wahpeton scored 12 of 15 (75%) from the line. Wahpeton's comeback was led by Gordon Amundson as they tied the score at 48-48 with 2:40 remaining. The Wops Harmon Krause, who was led to 5 points in the game, got a late basket and his 2 free throws with 2 seconds remaining clinched the Wahpeton championship. Roger Gebhart's 18 points led the Wop's scoring, while Slim Williams with 12 and Larry Treider with 10 points, were the Williston leaders.

Minot would stop Dickinson for the 1955 title and Grand Forks Central would stop Grafton in the 1956 championship game. Bismarck High, with legendary coach, Marshall Murdock at the reigns, would dominate the rest of the fifties as they finished the decade with three straight titles.



#### 1979 STATE CLASS A BOYS' TOURNAMENT

Lance Wolfs Wahpeton Wops and the Minot Magicians of coach Terry Hjemlstad took turns as the leaders of the 1978-79 State Class A Boys Basketball polls. Although both of them advanced to the 1979 state tourney, they had each suffered a loss in their respective regionals. Minot and Wahpeton had identical pre-state tournament records of 21 and 2 while coach Carl Wall's Fargo North Spartans were in at 19 and 5. The defending state champion Jamestown Bluejays of coach Jerry Meyer were in again with an 18 and 6 record and Dick Vinger's Grand Forks Central had also advanced with a mark of 17 and 5. The Williston Coyotes of coach Jim McPheson beat Minot in the northwest regional and carried a 16 and 7 record into the state tourney. Ken Keller's Dickinson Titans at 15 and 8 and the Bismarck High Demons (15-9) of coach Dwite Gorder made it through the southwest regional and completed the 1979 field of state tournament teams.

For the sixth year in a row, the Bison Field House, on the campus of North Dakota State University in Fargo, would be the scene of the Class A, and Fargo Public School Athletic Director, Harold Pedersen, would be the manager again. The officials for this year's tourney would be Howard Theige and Henry Milkey from Minot, Ted Uecker from Hettinger, Dallas Kopp and Richard Compton from Grand Forks, Dale Moug from Bismarck and Paul Gravel and Dave Heide from Fargo. Frank Smith was the NDHSAA Executive Secretary and the Association's President was Jamestown Superintendent, Frank Fischer.

Holding Fargo North's 6'9" center, Mike Wacker to 4 field goals in 5 attempts, Williston won the tournament opener with a 44-41 victory over North. Scott McPherson, with 24 points, scored over half of the points for his father's team. His four straight free throws in the final 56 seconds sealed the game for the Coyotes. Tracy Volney added 14 point's to the Coyotes' total while Wacker with 11 and Steve Lemke with 10 points paced the Spartans.

In the second game of first round play, Bismarck High was limited to 32 shots and had 21 turnovers in losing a three-pointer to Jamestown's defending champions, 41-38. The Blue Jays, trailing 34-33 early in the fourth quarter, scored the next 5 points to pick up the victory. The big junior, Paul Anderson, scored all but 16 of Jamestown's points on 5 free throws and 10 of 15 field goals. Brent Lick, with 14 points, was the only Demon in double figures.

Dickinson Trinity shot a respectable 47 percent from the field but were over-shadowed by Wahpeton's spectacular 60 percent shooting. The Wops, with a front line averaging 6' 5" won the game, 77-60 and were led in scoring by Kerry Nelson's 20 points, Dennis Eastman's 17, Mike Randall's 16 and Steve Krause with 15 points off the bench. Kevin Wanner's 24 points, Dan Bahley's 12 and Mark Haskin's 10 points paced the Titans.

Minot High, shooting 54% and with just 8 turnovers, ran up a 17-point half-time advantage over Grand Forks Central and were never challenged in posting 79 to 43 victory in the final game of the tournament's quarterfinals. Steve Mundy led the Minot scoring with 26 points while Craig Tweten with 14 and Dennis Kunkel with 11 added to the Magicians total. Scott Montgomery had 16 and Jeff Wilson 12 points for Central.

Fargo North took the lead in the third quarter and posted a 50 to 40 win over Bismarck High in Friday's consolation play. Steve Lemke scored 22 points for North while John Oxton added 11 and Mike Wacker 10 points to the Spartans' total. Brent Lick and Dave Munson were the Demon point leaders with 10 points each, a three point play by Grand Forks Central's Steve Conn in the last minute was the highlight of Central's 56-54 win over Dickinson Trinity in Fridays' other consolation game. Scott Montgomery scored 16 points for Central while Brad Burkholder added 12 and Steve Conn 10. Norm Heidt and Kevin Wanner each had 16 points and Dan Bahlev had 14 for Trinity.

Jamestown pulled out a 42 to 41 victory over the Williston Coyotes in a game that found the lead changing hands 18 times, The Blue Jays took a 42-37 lead with 51 seconds on the clock but gave up 2 free throws to the Coyotes' Kurt Andre and 2 more to Tracy Volney and twice, in the last 25 seconds, Williston had the ball with a chance to go ahead. The Coyotes had just 31 field goal attempts and scored on 14 of them (41%) while Jamestown got off 51 attempts and were successful on 18 of them (35%). Paul Anderson with 23 and Warren Wahi with 10 were the Blue Jay scoring leaders. Scott McPherson with 13 points was the only Williston players in double figures.

Wahpeton rolled into the state championship game with a 70 to 54 win over Minot in the second semi-final. The Wops continued their torrid shooting in the win as they scored on 23 of 36 (64%) field goal attempts and were even tougher at the free throw line, with 24 of 27



attempts. George Swenson led the Wops scoring with 21 points while Dennis Eastman scored 18 and Steve Krause 16. Curt Tweton with 18 was the only Magician in double figures.

6' 9" Mike Wacker scored 23 points and gathered 14 rebounds in leading Fargo North to a 49-42 victory over Grand Forks Central in the tournament's fifth place game. John Oxton and Jeff Debne, with 10 points apiece, added to the North total while Steve Conn with 16 and Brad Burkholder with 10 points were other Central leaders. Minot and Williston had played in three one pointers in the 1978-79 season with the Magicians winning both of the regular season games and Williston the title game in the Northwest Region. In their state tournament contest for third place, Minot survived a Williston rally to escape with a 58 to 53 victory, The Magicians' scoring leaders were Steve Mundy with 15, Dennis Kunkel with 14 and Craig Tweten with 10. Brent Tininenko scored 18 points for the Coyotes and was followed by Scott McPherson with 12

Wahpeton continued their torrid shooting to win the 1979 State Class A Championship. The Wops added a 58% percent field goal shooting percentage in the finals to 61 and 64 percentages in their first two games of the tourney. The Wops built up a 45 to 27 lead over Jamestown in the fourth quarter and withstood a furious rally by Jamestown to prevail by a 47-43 margin. It was revenge for the Wops who were upset by the Blue Jays in the Southeast Regional finals and gave them a final season's record of 24 wins and 2 losses. 6' 1" Kerry Nelson scored 15 points for the Wops and was the only scorer in double figures for Wahpeton. Paul Anderson scored 21 points and Bob Gunderson added 10 for the Blue Jays

#### **DEL GAB**

While Del Gab has established himself as one of the top multi-sport officials in North Dakota history during the past 45 years, his contributions in the areas of recruitment, training, mentoring and promotion of officiating at the local, state and national levels have been equally impressive.

A native of South Dakota, Gab began his officiating career in 1957 in basketball with the South Dakota High School Activities Association. He moved to North Dakota in 1960 and worked boys' basketball until 1992. He also officiated girls basketball from 1973 to 1990. Gab's post-season assignments in basketball included 14 boys' district tournaments, eleven boys' and nine girls' regionals, and three girls' state tournaments.

Although he worked baseball and softball for a few years and was a track starter for nine years, football became his sport of choice. He began football officiating in 1971 and remains active today. He has officiated 43 first-round and quarterfinal games, 21 semifinals and nine championship games in North Dakota. He officiated the first elevenman football championship game in North Dakota in 1976.

In addition to his high school assignments, Gab officiated college basketball from 1974 to 1992 and college football from 1975 to 1994, and for a final year in 1999.

More importantly than the games he has officiated, however, are the hundreds of new and younger officials who have benefited from Gab's leadership. He started the Rough Rider Officials Association mentoring program in 1973 and continues with that program today. He is a consultant for the North Dakota High School Association and assignor of officials for playoff games in southwest North Dakota. He has been an observer and evaluator of football and basketball officials for the past 25 years.

Gab was president of the North Dakota Officials Board for ten years and has served as state director for the NFHS Officials Association since 1984. He was an NFHS Officials Association board member from 1988 to 1993 and was president during the 1991-92 year. His most recent contribution to the NFHS has been his service as a member of the NFHS Official's Quarterly Publications Committee for seven years.

Gab earned his bachelor's degree from Northern State University in Aberdeen, South Dakota, and his master's and doctorate from the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks.

Among his awards, Gab has received an NFHS Officials Association Distinguished Service Award in 1995 and the NFHS Citation for Officials in 1997.

Still active as an insurance agent and football coach, Gab resides in Dickinson, North Dakota, with his wife Joyce.

#### STATE BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

#### **CLASS A TOURNAMENT HISTORIES**

It was the usual practice to have a drawing to determine first round state tournament opponents regardless of season records. The governor of the state or some other official conducted a drawing for the state tournament teams from 1914 to 1940. The teams were seeded into tournaments according to season records.

State tournaments were held over two days from 1914 to 1937. Games began on Friday morning at 10:00, and continued Friday afternoon and evening and Saturday morning, afternoon and evening. In the fall of 1937, the coaches also recommended a three-day tournament format instead of a two-day tournament. This plan went into effect the following year.

A challenge system developed in the Class A. Challenges from Class A schools lower in their divisions, and Class B schools, were allowed to challenge from 1933 till 1940. In some cases, schools played more than one challenge game in a season. The challenge had to be issued before December 31 each year. This was amended to January 21 in 1938. A team could withdraw the challenge by January 31.

- **1914-1919:** All high schools were eligible for a four team state tournament: Four regional champions went to the state tournament. Approximately 20 teams played for the honor to enter into the state championship.
- 1919: Basketball was catching on. Four districts were firmly established: 36 teams played for the right to enter the state tournament.

#### 1920-1932: All high schools played in an eight team state tournament:

- **1920:** Eight regional champions went to the state tournament. A total of 48 high schools played basketball in the eight district tournaments.
- **1925:** A total of 64 teams played for the right to participate in the state tournament.
- **1928:** Sixteen sub-district tournaments were held, with playoffs between sub-districts within a district, for the right to play in the state tournament.

#### 1933: State A playoffs began: holding regional and state tournaments.

There were 9 teams in Class A basketball. They were: Minot, Mandan, Jamestown, and Bismarck played in the west. Grand Forks, Devils Lake, Fargo, Wahpeton and Valley City played in the east. Enderlin challenged Valley City and won

- 1934: Playing this year were Grand Forks, Minot, Jamestown, Bismarck, Valley City, Mandan, Devils Lake, and Fargo. There were three challenge games.
- 1935: Teams: Grafton, Fargo, Mandan, Valley City, Wahpeton, Minot, Devils Lake, and Bismarck. Five challenge games were played.
- 1936: Twelve largest Class A schools (those over 250 students) played in the state tournament. Park River (Walsh County), Wahpeton, Dickinson and Williston joined Class A ranks. The top seeded teams from the each region received first round byes. Teams included: Bismarck, Devils Lake, Dickinson, Fargo, Grand Forks, Grafton, Jamestown, Mandan, Minot, Valley City, Wahpeton, and Williston. Two challenge games were played.
- 1937: Coaches recommend reducing the state tournament to eight teams. Schools were drawn by lot to participate in the state A tournament. Again, teams lower ranked the Class A or Class B schools could challenge those eight teams that, by luck, were drawn for the state tournament. Some teams felt that the challenge system was nothing more than a qualifying game for the state tournament. A total of two challenge games were played.
- 1938: The eight largest teams in Class A ranks. A total of six challenges were played. Larger Class B schools could issue challenges, when and if they had won the opportunity to go to the state tournament. The smaller school at Hannah challenged Williston and won.



1939-1940: The eight largest teams in Class A ranks. Osnabrock challenged Valley City and won. It was decided to designate a certain number of Class A schools as Class B. The teams would have to stay in that classification for two years.

1941-1946: An eight team tournament was established. Teams taking 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 5th place from the East and West regionals would go to the state tournament.

1944-1946: An eight team state tournament was established. The state was divided into four districts.

Northwest; Minot, St. Mary's, Williston, Minot St. Leo's

Southwest; Bismarck, Dickinson, Mandan, Jamestown.

Northeast; Devils Lake, Grand Forks, Walsh County, Grafton

Southeast; Fargo, Sacred Heart, Wahpeton, Valley City

The top two teams from one division would play the lower two teams from the division. The winners advance to the state tournament.

1947 to 1949: Four-team state tournament held. The first and second place East and West Division teams played in the state tournament.

1950-60: Teams placing 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 5th place in the regional tournaments qualified for state.

East Region: Grand Forks, Park River, Wahpeton, Shanley, Valley City, Grafton, Fargo, Devils Lake West Region: Dickinson, Williston, St. Mary's, Jamestown, Rugby, Bismarck, Minot, Mandan

1961 to 1963: Southeast, Northeast and West Regions: Top two teams in SE and NE regions and top four teams from West region automatically qualify for the state tournament.

1964 to 1980: Class A was divided into four regions; each region qualified two teams for the state tournament.




